Jeff Drummond enjoys many sports, but hockey has always been his favorite. He played all his minor hockey in Leduc, from ages six to 16, including five years with the Leduc Junior Athletic Club. At the age of nine he was team captain at the Team Brick Championship in 1991.

His Leduc Atom AA team won back-to-back provincial championships in 1992 and 1993. He was one of the top scorers in the league with Leduc Bantam AAA in 1996-97, and he was the leading scorer in his first year in Midget AAA hockey in 1998.



In the 1998-99 Midget AAA season with Leduc, Jeff won the Harry Allan Memorial Trophy for top scorer and the Trevor Linden Trophy for top forward.

He played for the Fort McMurray Oil Barons in the Alberta Junior Hockey League from 1999-2001, with the Barons winning the Royal Bank Cup in the 1999-2000 season. This helped lead to a scholarship for Jeff at the University of Denver, where he went on to play for four years with the NCAA Denver Pioneers. They won back-to-back national championships in 2004 and 2005. During the 2005 championship game, Jeff scored the first goal — his 100th point for the Pioneers. As NCAA champions, Jeff and the rest of the Pioneers were invited to the White House and met then-president George W. Bush.

Jeff lives in Leduc with his wife and two children. He enjoys spending time with his family and continues to play recreational hockey every week.
