FOCUS AREA1

A City Where People Want to Live, Work and Play

The City of Leduc is recognized as a great place to live as it is a safe, healthy, active, creative and caring community. It has a solid reputation for active citizen engagement and inclusivity, as well as respect for diversity. Its infrastructure efficiently and effectively meets the needs of a growing community and community organizations. Residents have access to recreation, arts and culture, housing and employment. The business community is strong and is the backbone of our economy.







Maclab: Revival a Success

After a couple of challenging years for the performing arts due to COVID-19, the Maclab Centre for Performing Arts in Leduc launched its 2022/2023 season, aptly themed Maclab: REVIVAL. In total, 26 performances were held in 2022 with the Wednesday Series seeing a 460 per cent increase in participation over previous years.

Approved Public Engagement Framework

The City's Public Engagement Framework was developed in early 2022 and approved by City Council in May that year. The Framework provides an outline for when and how the public will be invited into the City's decision-making process, and helps create a consistent, intentional and transparent approach to the City's engagement activities. An important step in developing the Framework involved engaging with employees and members of the public. In total, 245 residents and more than 30 City employees provided input as part of the process.





Protecting Catalytic Converters

Leduc City Council passed amendments to the Business License Bylaw in September 2022 to better manage the trade of illegal catalytic converters in the community – making it the first community in Canada to introduce such measures. Residents were also encouraged to participate in the "You Etch It, We Catch it." program where residents can have their VIN number engraved onto their catalytic converter for free; this program is offered through a partnership between the City, Leduc RCMP and local businesses.





Treaty, Truth and ReconciliACTION

The City made steps towards Truth and Reconciliation when its approach to Treaty, Truth and ReconiliACTION was approved in August 2022. The approach lays out a 12-month cycle of humility and learning and recognizes that we cannot take meaningful action without deeper understanding. The City's pledge to ReconciliACTION is that it is listening and will recognize, reflect, honour and celebrate Indigenous people and the positive influence their culture has on our community and region.

New Senior Housing

Telford Mews, a new senior's housing development in Leduc, welcomed its first residents in early 2022. The City was proud to partner with Christenson Group of Communities to advance the project and secure this major investment in the heart of Leduc. With 133 suites and a restaurant on the ground floor, it focuses on healthy living for seniors and is close to the hospital and other amenities. At six-storeys, it is the tallest wood framed building in the City and has encouraged more development in the area, fulfilling the vision of the developer and City Council.





Construction Begins on New High School

Construction on a new high school in the west side of Leduc broke ground in the spring of 2022. Expected to open in 2024, the school will accommodate up to 1,121 students and will belong to the Black Gold School Division. The City is pleased that construction on the facility is progressing, thanks to a \$33 million investment from the Government of Alberta, and is now exploring a recreational amenity for land nearby that will support our growing community and complement the new school.

Of note, the school is named Ohpaho Secondary School, which is a Cree word for "taking flight" and is an act of reconciliation and recognition that it is located on Treaty 6 territory. A committee of 13 members including City of Leduc Mayor Bob Young, Black Gold school trustees, students and community residents reviewed 89 naming submissions from the public and created a shortlist to recommend to the school board for decision.

FOCUS AREA 2

A City With a Plan for the Future

The City of Leduc is recognized for its capacity to meet the current needs of its residents and businesses today and into the future through creative and innovative approaches. It ensures that sustainability is integrated into its economic development, community development and environmental programs, services and infrastructure without compromising its long-term business owners and operators are satisfied with the value they receive for their tax dollars and the quality of



Updated Strategic Plan

In early 2022, the City released its updated 2023-2026 Strategic Plan, which was developed with input from the community and with growth in mind. It identifies focus areas, strategies, and performance indicators that will help Leduc meet the needs of the community over the next four years. The Strategic Plan outlines four goals, which are largely unchanged from the previous plan. The City of Leduc will continue to strive to be a city where people want to live; a city with a plan for the future; an economically prosperous city and region; and, a collaborative community-build and regional partner.

Electric Charging Station Unveiled

Leduc residents were charged up in 2022 when the City unveiled its first solar carport and electric vehicle charging station at 4821 50 Aveune. The charging station features 40-rooftop solar panels that power two level-two chargers, and two level-three chargers. As of March 2023, the charging station has been used more than 1,000 times. The City's commitment to environmental initiatives was recognized for this project by the Province in February 2023 when it received the Minister's Award for Environmental Innovation.



<u>Approved Homelessness Prevention</u> and Poverty Framework

Homelessness and poverty has an impact on every community and can impact individuals, families, youth, seniors, visible minorities and people with disabilities. In any municipality, the social programs and services necessary to support the local population are constantly evolving. As with many communities, Leduc faces challenges related to housing affordability, mental health and addiction, and supports to serve vulnerable populations.

To help address this, the City's Homelessness Prevention and Poverty Framework was approved in 2022 and outlines several strategies, policies and initiatives that complement other ongoing community efforts. It will also help guide collaborative partnerships in building a community response to these issues. The Framework focuses on four key priorities: access to housing; mental health and addiction; food security; and, improving access to services.





Coming Soon: Fire Hall 3

To support our growing community and to improve emergency response times, specifically in the industrial park, the City looks forward to the construction of Fire Hall 3 in our community. A forecasted capital investment of \$6.4 million for the facility was approved and will be funded through MSI, City reserves and a new fire offsite levy. The facility is expected to be built, staffed and operational by late 2025.

Equity, Diversity and Inclusion

In 2022, the City expedited its own EDI Initiative by contracting external EDI expertise to assist and guide us. Our goal is to see sustainable EDI transformation, and to meet three objectives: assess the organization's current environment and opportunities; develop and implement a City of Leduc EDI Strategy; and, set and monitor metrics for continuous improvement.



Modernized Administrative Processes

In 2022, City Administration made significant efforts to transition to Workday, an all-in-one software application to support its Finance and Human Resources processes. The City of Leduc is the first municipality in Canada to work with this service provider and has been recognized by others around the country as a leader in this area. The system has modernized the City's processes to incorporate efficiencies and improve our ability to effectively manage data, make decisions and be transparent, which will ultimately result in enhanced service to the community.

The City recognizes that expectations about the workplace have and are continuing to shift as individuals across all industries are reexamining what they want and need in the work environment. Organizations of all kinds are investing in equity, diversity and inclusion strategies and the City of Leduc is no different. It's fundamental in creating a thriving workplace culture, one that is welcoming, inclusive, supportive and allows people to challenge the status quo.

FOCUS AREA 3

An Economically Prosperous City and Region

The City of Leduc is open for business. It successfully leverages its proximity to the Edmonton International Airport and its access to road and rail infrastructure to attract and retain top commercial and industrial businesses, known as Alberta Aerotropolis. The local and regional economies are diversified and provide a wide range of employment opportunities. The City of Leduc is a regional employment centre with a thriving small business sector.










Tourism Creates Economic Investment

As a popular community for sports tourism, Leduc welcomed dozens of sport groups for tournaments and events last year. These activities bring a surge of economic investment to the community as many athletes, coaches and spectators stay overnight, eat and shop in our city.

For example, the Wild Rose Invitational, a figure skating event, returned to Leduc from July 29 to Aug. 1, drawing roughly 1,800 visitors to the city. During their stay they spent roughly \$334,000 on lodging, food and activities. Additionally, it was also announced in late 2022 that the City of Leduc will host the Alberta 55+ Summer Games in 2025, which will have an estimated economic impact of \$650,000 on the local economy.





New Opportunities for Growth

In May 2022, the Province made changes to the Edmonton Airport Vicinity Protection Area regulation, creating new opportunities for significant growth and redevelopment in the City of Leduc. The City worked tirelessly, alongside many stakeholders and regional partners, to advocate for these changes. This collaborative work included Edmonton International Airport, the Province of Alberta, industry leaders, neighbouring municipalities, residents, businesses and City staff. The changes will help accelerate the strategic economic development in Leduc and the region, allowing for more business opportunities and economic prosperity.

Commerical, Industrial Building Permits Tripled

Strong commercial and industrial growth in 2022 shows Leduc continues to be a desirable place to invest and grow a business. Commercial and industrial building permits tripled, with several new buildings added to the Leduc Business Park; NTS Amega West's new 48,500-square-foot facility was one of three new buildings on Allard Avenue alone. Existing buildings also filled up quickly, reducing vacancy rates. For example, Alstar Group and Nine Lions Bioscience moved into existing facilities in Leduc in 2022.





Exciting Activity Downtown

Leduc's downtown area was bustling with activity last year. The largest development was Black Gold Plaza, which added four new commercial buildings with several tenants expected to move in by spring 2023. The Stein Business Centre on 48 Street neared completion, as did the Canada Diagnostic Centre (formerly Ken's Furniture) in Leduc City Centre Mall. Several new businesses opened on Leduc's historic Main Street, where vacancy rates continue to decline. With lots to see and do, residents are invited to come and explore Leduc's vibrant downtown.



FOCUS AREA 4

A Collaborative Community-Builder and Regional Partner

The City of Leduc is widely recognized as a trusted and effective partner in and around Leduc and is a leader at the Edmonton Metropolitan Region Board and Edmonton Global. It is cited as a leader in regional and inter-municipal collaboration. The City and Leduc County collaborate to identify and implement initiatives to improve services, share costs and drive economic outcomes.







65th Avenue Interchange Moves Forward

After much anticipation, the City reached two major milestones on the 65th Avenue Interchange in 2022 when the project became fully funded in May and ground was broken in November. The project, which is being jointly funded by the Government of Alberta (\$96.4 million) and City of Leduc (\$15.7 million), will connect 65th Avenue and the Edmonton International Airport via an overpass across the Queen Elizabeth II Highway and is expected to be completed in late 2025. This critical infrastructure project will support safety and ease of movement of people and goods and help stimulate local and regional economic development.

In partnership with the City, TELUS completed its \$45 million PureFibre build in Leduc in late 2022, connecting more than 13.000 homes and 2.000 businesses directly to gigabit Internet speeds while expanding cellular coverage throughout the region. TELUS also connected 17 municipal sites, including the RCMP station and local fire hall The entire project was completed in 20 months and will support the Citu's growing business community. It is expected to drive economic growth and diversification that will attract new investors and industries to the area. Residents will enjoy improved access to virtual health and educational services. important home and cyber security services that keep them safe, and the latest entertainment platforms that enrich their lives



Federal Funding Supports Clean Energy Improvement Program

In April, the City of Leduc received \$4.1 million (over 4 years) in federal funding to implement the Clean Energy Improvement Program (CEIP) and throughout the year approved 21 projects to begin helping homeowners get started on energy improvement projects on their properties. Upgrades included installing solar photovoltaic systems and solar water-heating, high-efficiency furnaces, and home insultation. This program supports the City's continued efforts to help lower greenhouse gas emissions and will help Leduc remain a healthy and attractive community where families want to live

Partnering to Create Hub for Arts and Culture

In partnership with the City and Maclab Centre, the Leduc Arts Foundry continued to create a hub for arts and culture in Leduc by offering open mic nights, free youth events, the annual Art Walk and more. In 2022, the Foundry welcomed 7,400 visitors to its gallery and was supported by 6,000 volunteer hours, which represents a 56 and 57 per cent increase from 2021. Of all who were impacted by this partnership, 68 per cent call Leduc home.





LRC Welcomes New Sponsors

As a collaborative community builder, the City recently partnered with Leduc Plumbing and Heating (LPH), a proud sponsor of youth and adult sport and recreation in the community for over 70 years, and FortisAlberta through sponsorship agreements at the Leduc Recreation Centre (LRC) in April and December, respectively.

Patrons at the facility will recognize the LPH Boardroom, located on the east side of the building. The last few years have



been challenging for our local business community and so their support amid these difficult times speaks volumes about their commitment and care for Leduc and our residents. Similarly, FortisAlberta sponsored the statement fireplace and meeting area in the centre of the LRC. This was marked with a festive holiday event, giving local families a chance to gather round the fireplace for hot chocolate and photos with Santa.
