City lowers cost to ride LATS

On December 13, 2021, Leduc City Council approved lowering the fare for Leduc Assisted Transportation Services (LATS).

Effective January 1, 2022, LATS fare will be on par with local Leduc Transit fares:

- Monthly Pass: \$55/month (previously \$140/month)
- Ticket Books: \$18/10 tickets (previously \$40/11 tickets)
- One-way Fare: \$2 (previously \$4)

January bus passes (for both Leduc Transit and LATS) will go on sale Monday, December 20, 2021. Local monthly bus passes (\$55) are valid on both LATS and Leduc Transit.

If you still have tickets left over, a \$4 ticket will be worth two rides on LATS from January 1 onward. Please reach out to the LATS office for more information at 780-980-8444.

Snow and Ice

Winter weather has arrived! Clients are reminded to ensure driveways, sidewalks and steps at their residences are clear of snow, ice and other debris this winter.

LATS operators are not obligated to pick clients up if these conditions are not met. Slippery sidewalks and driveways can be hazardous for both clients and operators.

Moving clients who use mobility devices such as wheelchairs can be very difficult on snowy driveways and walkways.

Extreme weather plan now in effect

During the winter months, the Leduc Hub Association offers overnight shelter for up to 12 people from 9:30 p.m. to 7:30 a.m. at 5110 47 Street, Leduc.

Residents seeking warmth outside of the Leduc Hub overnight hours are also encouraged to visit the Leduc Civic Centre or the Leduc Recreation Centre (with proof of vaccine) during regular business hours.

When temperatures drop below –25 degrees, the community's extreme weather plan is initiated and the Leduc GO Centre (operated by Gateway Family Church) becomes available for the vulnerable population to keep warm during the following hours:

- Monday to Thursday: 8 9:30 p.m.
- Friday and Saturday: 5–9:30 p.m.
- Sunday: 4–9:30 p.m.

The Leduc Go Centre is located in the same building as the Leduc Hub.

Leduc is a kind, caring, and compassionate community that supports all of our residents, including the vulnerable population. If you know or see someone in our community who needs support during this stretch of extreme weather, please refer them to the Leduc Hub (5110 47 Street) or to Leduc FCSS (#1 Alexandra Park).

City of Leduc deploys snow crews to keep roads clear and safe

With the first major snowfall of the season, Leduc's fleet of snow plows, graders and sanders have been deployed to keep our nearly 500 km of streets and lanes clear of snow and ice.

Crews have begun snow plowing, which will be followed by street sanding and then snow removal. Residents are asked to please be patient, drive safe, and give the equipment space to do their work.

Snow clearing and removal is a team effort, and small acts can make a huge difference. The cooperation of residents is a tremendous help in keeping our community's roads safe and clear throughout the season. Residents are encouraged to support snow crews by:

- Staying up-to-date on snow clearing efforts at our website
- Cooperating with signage posted in your neighbourhood by moving vehicles off the street
- Giving equipment the space to do its job
