Some highlights are: Council is following the provincial lead on lifting capacity restrictions. Unprecedented year for snow removal – due to large amount of snow the Leduc snow removal crews 			

	 changed to a 24-hour, 6 days a week schedule to keep up with all the local roads cleared, the schedule went back to the 12-hour schedule for the winter season starting February 7, 2022. RCMP report overall persons crimes are down, property crimes are down, and other crimes are up. A survey went out asking for input on the City's approach to public engagement and responses will be used to help form a Public Engagement Framework. Citizen of Distinction Awards – please consider submitting nomination Currently, there is a Public Engagement in regards to the implementation of a provincial police force. An update from the Economic Development in the City indicated that there is increased industrial growth in the past year. There is a plan to demolish the old Covenant Health office building at Grant MacEwan University and build a Wellness Hub – Phase 1 will be for outpatient clinic for Grey Nuns; Phase 2 is for multigenerational housing market - senior's independent living, affordable housing, expansion to other business identified needs. The City of Edmonton and the Federal Government announced two projects to increase affordable housing options by repurposing two former hotels in Edmonton with a budget of 14.8 M: The Days Inn on University Ave which will be operated by the Mustard Seed, and the Sands Hotel on Fort Road which will be home for indigenous people. The Alberta Economic Recovery Plan under Building for the Future announced two projects, 5.9 million of which going to Municipalities. The City of Leduc has great support and relationships with the provincial government and the airport road plan received support. Uncertainties around COVID restrictions being lifted by the provincial government.

4.1	Homelessness Task Force	 The Homeless and Poverty Prevention Task Force update: Background: The contractor's research showed that in Leduc there are 20 homeless individuals and 480 house/families living well below the poverty line; 12 key strategies were identified; some are short, middle, and long-term strategies 4 Key Areas directly related to homelessness and poverty prevention are: access to services, housing, mental health and addictions, and food security. The contractor will be presenting strategies to address each of these areas. Framework draft will be presented to Council on March 21st In Leduc, there is a shortage of single/bachelor/1-bedroom housing available. Transitional Housing – "bridge" housing for a person while preparing to become or move into independent or subsidized housing. Support workers are available to provide resources to an individual until a permanent housing is identified and setting that person up towards independence and success.
