## **Tips for Travelling with LATS**

- Have your valid LATS pass or LATS ticket ready prior to boarding.
- If you need to purchase tickets, have your fare ready for the driver.
- LATS passes can be purchased online or at the Leduc Recreation Centre or the Civic Centre (City Hall).

- Board the bus carefully and be considerate of your fellow passengers who are already seated.
- Once seated, ensure your bags are placed under the seat directly in front of you.
- Buckle up. If you need assistance, just ask your driver.
- Be aware of your surroundings so that you know when you are approaching your destination.
- Remain seated at all times and until the bus has come to a complete stop at your destination.
- Ensure that you double check that you have not left anything behind such as your purse, phone, packages or cane.
- When you are disembarking from the bus, take your time while navigating the steps down to the sidewalk or driveway.

#### **How does your Garden Grow?**

In Alberta, the average frost-free day happens around the end of May, which is when most of us finally plant our bedding plants in our gardens. We keep our fingers crossed and cover our plants as needed for the first few nights. Seeds on the other hand, can generally be planted about the middle of May. Once they sprout, we still have to cover these precious little plants, until things warm up.

We watch things grow throughout June and into the fall, spending time weeding between the rows and fertilizing and watering, as needed. Early crops such as rhubarb, can be pulled or cut around the beginning of June.

The stalks of the plant should be at least 10 inches before you do harvest them. Once you have harvested your rhubarb, cut the leafy end off and discard it. The leaves are poisonous so do not eat them.

Wash your stalks and cut up into 1-inch pieces. At this point, you can either freeze the rhubarb for later use or you can make, jam, jelly cake or a pie.

Here's my recipe for rhubarb pie. Enjoy!

#### **Rhubarb Pie:**

For the crust...



Measure 5 cups of flour into a deep bowl. Add 1 teaspoon of salt. Cut in 1 pound of Burn's pastry lard or shortening. Mix well until mixture looks crumbly.

Put 1 egg into a one-cup measuring cup and add 1 tablespoon of white vinegar. Fill the rest with lukewarm water to the 1 cup mark. Stir well and then add to the flour mixture. Mix well. Form into six balls. Freeze four of the balls in plastic wrap.

Roll out the remaining two on a lightly floured surface into circles that are 1 inch larger than the diameter of your pie pan. Gently lift the first one into your pan.

In a large bowl add the following and mix well:

- 4 1/2 cups of chopped rhubarb
- 1 1/3 cups of white sugar
- 6 tablespoons of flour
- the zest of one lemon
- 1/2 teaspoon of salt

Fill your prepared crust and dot with butter. Gently place the other piece of rolled-out crust on top. Crimp the edges of your pie together either with your fingers or by using a fork. Cut in 2 or 3 vents on the top of your pie for the steam to escape while baking.

Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes then turn the heat down to 375 degrees and bake an additional 45 minutes. If it is browning too fast, cover with foil. Remove from the oven and sprinkle with a little sugar.

- Open up the Live Leduc App and enter your login details.

Each patron needs to set up their own app account with an email.

If you are an LRC and/or Live Leduc member, the email address in our system and your app account should be the same. This will allow the app to validate your membership allowing you to have easy check-in with the barcode on your phone (your LRC membership card will no longer be needed).

If you do not have an LRC and/or Live Leduc Account, there is a "Guest Sign-in" option where you can set up a basic account with your email and phone number. If you are having any difficulties, please call Guest Services 780-980-7120 and they will be able to add you as a user over the phone.

#### CELEBRATING HERITAGE

This year the Edmonton *Heritage Festival* will be held July 31<sup>st</sup> to August 2<sup>nd</sup>. The Festival is a time to introduce us to various cultures from around the world. Therefore, I thought that this would be the opportune time to introduce you to my heritage, which is Guatemalan.

Guatemala is a truly magical and beautiful country. It is a country in Central America, which is sandwiched between Mexico to the north, El Salvador and Honduras to the south, and Belize to the east. It has the Pacific Ocean on the west, and a short border on the Caribbean Sea on the east.

It has exquisite mountain scenery, verdant tropics, soaring volcanos, deep mountain lakes, and a myriad of ancient Mayan monuments that have been uncovered from the jungle, such as the great city of Tikal. In fact, modern science has determined that there are more than 60,000 hidden Mayan ruins in Guatemala.

Maya civilisation, at its peak some 1,500 years ago, covered an area about twice the size of medieval England, with an estimated population of around five million.

But the true beauty of the Country can be



found in its people. At least 39% of Guatemala's almost 18 million citizens are of indigenous

decent (the highest percentage of any country in the Western Hemisphere), 41% are of mixed European and Indigenous ancestry, and the balance are of European decent.

There is so much culture in Guatemala, both Mayan and Spanish. It is fascinating that Mayan is still spoken by the Mayans, who to this day dress in their brightly colored clothes, as they have done for centuries. The Mayan still partake in pre-Hispanic rituals and beliefs in the fascinating City of Chichicastenango, where the world renown market exists. Mayan

villages and volcanos surround the shores of Lake Atitlan (called by some the most beautiful lake in the world).

The capital of Guatemala is Guatemala City.

volcanos. Stepping into Antigua is like going back 300 years. Much of the Spanish architecture dates from the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries. Antigua was declared *'Monument of America'* in 1965, and later a World Heritage Site by UNESCO.

The city was founded in the early 16<sup>th</sup> century by the Spanish. Antigua became the capital of Central America and was the centre of religion, the arts and education. The first University in Central America was founded here. Unfortunately, the City was built over a geologic fault, and was subjected throughout history to many serious earthquakes, so much so, that it was finally decided in the 18<sup>th</sup> century when most of the buildings were demolished by a serious earthquake to move the capital to Guatemala City. Many of these ruins are still evident in Antigua today, which only serves to add to the City's mystery.

Antigua is one of the unique places in the world. Its legends and stories of ghosts; its religious traditions (the processions and beautiful carpets during Holy Week of Semana Santa), and its culture are fascinating.

Guatemala has a strong culture, fascinating history, beautiful nature, interesting and historical architecture, beautiful handcrafts, 5-star hotels, cacao, and the best coffee you will find anywhere

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# for People with Disabilities

There's no place like home. It is a place to relax, share laughs with family, and enjoy home cooked meals. But did you know that the majority of fire deaths occur in the home? Help everyone in the home stay safe from fire.



#### **Home Fire Sprinklers**

Home fire sprinklers protect lives by keeping fires small. Sprinklers allows people more time to escape in a fire. When choosing an apartment or home, look for one that has home fire sprinklers.

#### Smoke Alarms

- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.
- Test your smoke alarm at least once a month by pushing the test button. If you can't reach the alarm, ask for help.
- For added safety, interconnect the smoke alarms. If one sounds, they all sound. This gives more time to escape.
- Smoke alarms with sealed (long-life) batteries work for up to 10 years. They can be helpful for people who find it hard to change batteries.
- Smoke alarms expire. Replace them every 10 years.

#### People who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing

- Smoke alarms and alert devices are available for people who are deaf or hard or hearing.
- Strobe lights flash when the smoke alarm sounds. The lights warn people of a possible fire.
- When people who are deaf are asleep, a pillow or bed shaker can wake them so they can escape.
- When people who are hard of hearing are asleep, a loud, mixed, low-pitched sound alert device can wake them. A pillow or bed shaker may be helpful. These devices are triggered by the sound of the smoke alarm.



#### **Escape Planning**

Include everyone in home escape planning. Each person should have input about the best ways to escape. Home fire drills are important. Everyone in the home must participate in them. Keep a phone by your bed in case you can't escape and need to call for help.

Talk with someone from the fire department about your escape plan. Ask them review your plan. Ask if your fire department keeps a directory of people who may need extra help. If you have a service animal, agree on a plan to keep the animal with you during an emergency.
